Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XII Traditionally, the *Aspérges* is sung at the beginning of the Solemn Mass on a Sunday. The priest sprinkles the altar with holy water, then himself and the servers, and then all of the people, as the choir sings verses from Psalm 50:

Aspérges me. Dómine, hyssópo, et mundábor: lavábis me, et super nivem dealbábor.(*Thou shalt sprinkle me, O Lord, with hyssop, and I shall be cleansed; Thou shalt wash me, and I shall become whiter than snow.*)

Miserére mei, Deus, secúndum magnam misericórdiam tuam. (*Have mercy on me, O God, according to Thy great mercy.*)

Glória Patri, et Fílio, et Spirítui Sancto. Sicut erat in princípio, et nunc, et semper, et in sæcula sæculórum. Amen. (*Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.*)

The then choir repeats, 'Aspérges me..,' and the priest concludes with a Collect or short prayer.

The ceremony dates from at least the 8th century and is, in essence, a shortened version of the blessing of the people with Holy Water at the Easter Vigil which, in turn, is a liturgical extension of the cleansing of the soul from sin in Baptism. Because the ceremony couldn't be repeated at every weekday Mass, the practice eventually grew up of having holy water stoops at the entrance to churches so that people could bless themselves with holy water every time they entered and left the church. At St Pancras, the choir sings the *Aspérges* on alternate Sunday. (During Eastertide, the *Aspérges* is replaced with the *Vidi Aquam*.)

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At the start of every Mass, on Sundays and weekdays, at high Masses and low Masses, we have the *Introit* or *Entrance Antiphon*. It is taken from a verse of one of the psalms, or from some other passage of Scripture, or just occasionally is a line composed by the Church and suited to the feast of the day. Originally, the whole psalm was sung by the choir as the priest processed to the altar, with the *Gloria Patri* being sung as he arrived, and any remaining verses of the psalm being omitted. By the early Middle Ages it had become common to sing just one verse rather than the whole psalm.

If the Mass were a play, the *Introit* or *Entrance Antiphon* would be its prologue. Given that, properly speaking, it should be sung, then a better comparison might be to compare the Mass to an opera and the *Introit* to its overture. It opens to us the main theme of the Mass, unfolding before our eyes the great mystery that is just about to be presented to us as well as stealing into the heart and arousing fitting sentiments there also, as one writer puts it. In other words, it appeals to both the intellect and the emotions.

The *Introit* heralds the opening of the Mass, and is as much an acclamation of the Mass as the *Alleluia!* verse is of the Gospel. For this reason, and because the *Entrance Anti-*phon is an integral part of the Mass, it should not really be replaced with a hymn, although where there is no choir to sing the *Introit* to its proper musical setting a hymn is often sung instead.

Given that the Mass is primarily something Christ does, and not something that we do, try to imagine Our Lord saying (or, better still, singing) the words of the *Entrance Antiphon* on our behalf! When thought of in this way, the *Introit* becomes a proclamation in praise of the Almighty and Undivided Trinity sung by Our Lord on behalf of a fallen race. The Son of God Incarnate gives to the Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit, fitting praise; He raises His voice in a level of adoration which we sinners cannot properly give.

The *Introit* is often overlooked but it invariably repays close attention as well as meditative and prayerful reflection.
