Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. **Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XIII** 'If therefore thou offer thy gift at the altar, and there thou remember that thy brother hath any thing against thee; Leave there thy offering before the altar, and go first to be reconciled to thy brother: and then coming thou shalt offer thy gift' (Mt 5:23-24). We cannot offer a worthy gift at the altar of God if we are at odds with our brother or sister. Therefore, at the beginning of every Mass we say sorry for our sins both to Almighty God and to our neighbour.

In an age of entitlements and rights we run the risk of forgetting the purpose of our religion. We, as individuals and as a race, do not stand righteous before the face of God. As a result of Adam's original sin (which left human nature itself damaged) and of our own actual sins, as well as our continuing tendency towards sin (which we call concupiscence), the human race was alienated from its Creator. The sanctifying grace in Adam's soul and his state of original justification were forfeited by him at the Fall. Having once held these gifts from God on behalf of the whole human race, Adam forfeited these gifts for the whole human race. Consequently, we are all born into a state of alienation from God, tainted as we are by the stain of Adam's original sin. (All of us, that is, except for the Blessed Virgin Mary of course who was conceived immaculate.) We can only be redeemed from this state of alienation by the grace of God in the Sacrament of Baptism.

Sadly, because we continue to sin throughout our lives, we need to renew the grace of Baptism in our souls again and again by repeatedly saying sorry to Almighty God and by going to Him on bended knee and with penitent hearts. Chiefly, we do this in the Sacrament of Confession, but we should also make an Act of Contrition at the end of every day as part of our night prayers. In addition, we begin each Mass by confessing our sins to Almighty God, to Our Blessed Lady, all the angels and saints, and to our neighbour. Remember, even the most hidden sin which does not appear to have any effect on anyone else still has an impact on the whole Mystical Body of Christ, the whole Communion of Saints. Each act of virtue helps to build up Christ's Mystical Body but each sin impacts upon it negatively. Therefore, before we present our gifts to God at His altar during Mass we must say sorry.

In the *Confiteor* (the 'I Confess') we confess our guilt and far from trying to hide our culpability we absolutely insist on it, three times in fact: *mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa*. 'Through my fault, through my fault, through my most grievous fault.' Like the humble publican who stood afar off and beat his breast (Lk 18:13) we, too, strike our breast at this point, the three strikes representing, first, the three sources of our sins (our hearts, our wills, and our passions), second, that our hearts are crushed by repentance (from the Latin verb, *conterere*, to crush or grind down which is also the origin of our word 'contrition'), and third, that we accept in a spirit of reparation the blows from divine justice as penalties for our sin. (In other words, we accept the tribulations that come our way in daily life and offer them to God as penances for our sins.)

Then we plead with Our Blessed Lady and all the angels and saints to pray for us that we might receive God's mercy.

Finally, we say the *Kyrie eleison* (the 'Lord have mercy'). The three-fold *Kyrie eleison*, *Christe eleison*, *Kyrie eleison* in Greek was originally part of a much longer litany calling for God's mercy upon His people and dating back to at least the fourth century in the east. It was introduced into the Roman Rite by Pope Gelasius at the end of the fifth century.

The first *Kyrie* (Lord) is addressed to God the Father, the *Christe* is addressed to God the Son, and the last *Kyrie* to the Holy Spirit who is also 'Lord.' God the Son is 'Lord' as well, of course, but *Christe* is used here because of the relation of this word to the Incarnation.

Traditionally, there were always three *Kyries*, three *Christes*, and three *Kyries*, which reminded us of our union with the nine choirs of angels who sing the glory of God in heaven. This union, then, prepares us to join the angels in their great hymn, the *Gloria*, which, in many Masses, follows on immediately.
