Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XVII During a solemn Mass, the Gospel is surrounded with more ceremony than anything else except the Blessed Sacrament and the altar. From ancient times the Book of the Gospels has been venerated, and is the only book which is bowed before and kissed, incensed, signed with the cross, and carried in procession. Whereas the other readings from the Scriptures during Mass are venerable, they are regarded as the words of the servants of the Word. The Gospel, on the other hand, contains the verba Verbi, 'the words of the Word' Himself. 'The Gospel is the mouth of Christ,' says St Augustine. Elsewhere he adds, 'We should listen to the Gospel as though God Himself spoke to us.' The eighth Œcumenical Council of Constantinople (AD 869-70) required the veneration of the Gospels, but the honour is not paid to the book itself, to the paper and print, but to Christ, the Word of God, whom the pages represent. When we kiss or incense the Gospel book, we adore Christ Himself.

The tradition of having two lecterns or ambos — one from which the Epistle or First Reading is read, and a separate one from which the Gospel is proclaimed — is also ancient. This, again, marked the distinction between non-Gospel and Gospel readings, as does the fact that everyone stands to hear the Gospel proclaimed but remains seated to listen to other readings. Properly speaking, the deacon proclaims the Gospel, and it has been the preserve of the deacon to do so since at least the beginning of the fifth century, but with one peculiar exception. In the Middle Ages, the Emperor proclaimed the Gospel at Midnight Mass, Exiit edictum a Cæsare Augusto, 'There went out a decree from Cæsar Augustus.' In other words, the Emperor of the day proclaimed the words of the Emperor at the time of the Nativity. So, for example, Charles IV proclaimed the Gospel at Basle in 1347, at Mainz in 1353, and at Cambrai in 1377, and Frederick III proclaimed it in Rome in 1452, in the presence of the Pope no less! And Charles V proclaimed it in Bologna in 1529.

There are no special preparatory prayers during the Mass for whoever reads the Epistle or First Reading. However, for the Gospel the deacon, or priest where there is no deacon, makes a prayer of preparation and asks for a blessing before daring to proclaim the Word of God. Traditionally, these prayers read: Munda cor meum... 'Cleanse my heart and my lips, Almighty God, who didst cleanse the lips of the Prophet Isaiah with a burning coal (Is 6:5-7); and vouchsafe through Thy gracious mercy so to purify me that I may worthily proclaim Thy holy Gospel. Through Christ Our Lord Amen.' The deacon would then ask the priest for a blessing, or the priest (if he were to read the Gospel) would ask Almighty God for a blessing, saying: Jube, Domine, benedicere. 'Pray, Lord, a blessing.' And the priest would bless the deacon saying, 'May the Lord be in your heart and on your lips, that thou may worthily and in becoming manner announce His holy Gospel: in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.' The Gospel book is then carried, accompanied by acolytes bearing candles, from the altar to where it is to be proclaimed, and incensed.

As the Gospel is intoned, the deacon makes a small sign of the Cross on the page of the book, then on his forehead, lips, and heart. The people follow suit, quietly muttering a prayer as they do so: 'May the Lord be in my mind, and on my lips, and in my heart. Amen.'

The Gospel is then sung, in a solemn Mass, and having been proclaimed with more ceremony than the other readings (including with the greeting, 'The Lord be with you...') so it concludes with more ceremony, the people acknowledging the Word by chanting, *Laus tibi*, *Christe*, 'Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.'

It is interesting to note that until the liturgical changes in 1969, exactly the same Gospel had been proclaimed on each day in the Church's year for at least 1,200 years!

The sermon that follows the Gospel was, traditionally, not considered part of the Mass because the Mass is chiefly an act of worship rather than a teaching session, so the priest, traditionally, would remove the maniple from his arm while he preached.
