CRIB TILL CANDLEMAS

If you have not yet taken down your crib at home please consider leaving it in place till the feast of Candlemas on 2^{nd} February. Why? First, that is the traditional date when cribs come down, drawing to a close the Church's 'season of light' (see last week's newsletter); and second, because, although the world has already forgotten about Christmas, our Faith teaches us to welcome Our Lord into our hearts and minds long after the rest of the world has ceased to take any notice of Him. His presence in the crib serves as a 'sign of contradiction,' (as Simeon will say in the Gospel at Candlemas, Lk 2:34), long after all the other Christmas decorations have been packed away.

Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XXVII We resume our look at the Mass, which we interrupted for a couple of weeks over Christmas, by considering the next prayer in the Canon, the *Communicantes*, 'In communion with...'

The Communicantes forms the second part of the Memento which we looked at in Part XXVI. In the Memento we prayed for the living. Now, in the Communicantes, we pray to (not for) those living souls who are already fully united with God in heaven, beginning with the 'glorious and ever-Virgin Mary, Mother of our God and Lord, Jesus Christ.' As Queen of Apostles and Martyrs, the Blessed Virgin heads a blood-stained list of both Apostles and Martyrs.

But first comes the name of St Joseph, her spouse, whose name was added to the Roman Canon by Pope John XXIII as recently as 1962. (The wording of the Canon had previously remained unchanged for 1,362 years after Pope St Gregory the Great added a few words in the year AD 600.) Since the seventh century, no pope had dared to alter so sacred a text.

At the top of the list **Peter**, as the Prince of the Apostles and first pope, is accompanied by **Paul**, the Apostle to the Gentiles, both of whom became known as the Apostles of the city of Rome following their martyrdoms in the year AD 67 when St Peter was crucified upside down (because he deemed himself unworthy to die in exactly the same fashion as Our Lord), and St Paul who, as a citizen of the Roman Empire, was beheaded.

ANDREW comes next as the first of the remaining ten, in part because he was the first true Apostle, that is, the first one who, having found the Messiah, went to call someone else to follow Our Lord (Jn 1:41), and in part because of who it was that he called, namely Simon Peter, his brother. Next comes JAMES, the son of Zebedee, and his brother JOHN, the beloved disciple, followed by the others according to the order of their feast days in the Church's liturgical calendar at the time when the Roman Canon was written (that is, some 1,600 years or more before the changes introduced in 1969): Doubting THOMAS, called the Twin; James the Less, the son of Alphaeus; Philip, whose voice is heard several times in the Gospels; BARTHOLOMEW, also called Nathanael in Jn 1:43-51, who was flayed alive; MATTHEW, also called Levi, a former tax collector and the writer of one of the four Gospels; Simon the Zealot, who died by being sawn apart; and JUDE, also called Thaddaeus, who wrote a Letter in the New Testament and who died by the axe alongside Simon the Zealot.

Then follows a list of twelve martyrs, each of whom has an especial connection with Rome, either having been born there or having his relics enshrined in the city, except Cyprian of Carthage who was, however, a famous champion of the unity of the Church, and was popularly venerated in Rome. The names are in hierarchical order: five popes; a bishop; a deacon; and five laymen. LINUS was St Peter's successor as Bishop of Rome. CLETUS succeeded Linus as the third pope. CLEMENT, whose relics are preserved at San Clemente in Rome. Sixtus II was beheaded having been found saying Mass in the catacomb of Callistus. Cornelius was martyred in exile in modern day Civitavecchia. CYPRIAN, whose veneration was always closely connected with that of Cornelius. LAWRENCE was martyred three days after Pope Sixtus II whose deacon he was. Chrysogonus was arrested in Rome, although martyred in Aquileia. JOHN and PAUL, two officers at the imperial palace. And Cosmos and Damian, two doctors who refused payment for their services. The lives of martyrs are said to be crowned by their martyrdom. These twenty-four martyrs—the twelve Apostles and the twelve saints from the Early Church—represent all the martyrs, and symbolize the twenty-four Elders seated around the throne of the Lamb in white garments in the Book of the Apocalypse who cast their crowns before the throne in an act of homage (4:10).
