## FR FRANCIS 'SAM' LEEDER RIP 1939—2022

Parish priest of St Pancras 1981-2019

Fr Leeder, a very devoted and much loved parish priest, died on Sunday, 13<sup>th</sup> February from a heart attack, aged 82. Following a recent knee operation, he was recovering in Ipswich hospital and was undergoing physiotherapy, although still making use of an oxygen mask, when he died unexpectedly late on Sunday afternoon. He is survived by his nephew Christopher and niece Jennifer, whose father, Fr Leeder's slightly younger brother John, died in 2010.

Fr Leeder was born on 12<sup>th</sup> March 1939, the same day that Pope Pius XII was crowned, to Maria from Carlisle and Francis who was from Great Yarmouth. Fr Leeder's time as parish priest of St Pancras was not, of course, his first sojourn in Orwell Place. Having studied for the priesthood at Ushaw, Fr Leeder was ordained on 9<sup>th</sup> June 1963, in the days when East Anglia and Northampton were all one diocese, and offered his first Mass at St Joseph's, Luton, the following day. His first placement as a curate was at St Pancras under, first, Canon John Thompson, then Fr Edward McBride, and finally Fr Norman Smith, during which time he reformed the 12<sup>th</sup> Ipswich Scout Group. In 1970 he moved to St John's in Norwich, still six years away from becoming a cathedral, before being appointed parish priest of St Thomas' in Woodbridge in September 1973. Fr Leeder returned to St Pancras in July 1981 where he remained until he retired to Melton in August 2019.

How even to begin to recount the countless thousands of kindnesses and amusing anecdotes? Stories abound about railways, boating, scouting, pubs, Tavern Evenings, and roundabouts! His quirky ways will be remembered by many, and for years to come. Details of the funeral arrangements will follow, but in the meantime, we pray that the Angels and saints may welcome him into paradise for a long-awaited and well deserved reward.

Father F.A. Leeder has left St. Pancras parish, Ipswich, having been assistant priest there since his ordination seven years ago. He has been replaced by Father Stephen Doupe, parish priest at St. Ives until ill-health necessitated his giving up this responsibility.

Fr. Leeder has moved to St. John's parish, Norwich, and the farewell presentation of a £115 cheque to him from parishioners was made the occasion for a party in a packed St. Pancras Hall, attended by all the Ipswich clergy.

The cheque was presented by one of the oldest parishioners, Mr. Michael Finn. Tribute to Fr. Leeder was paid by Mr. H. Church, who said:

"Seven is one of those numerals that crops up again and again in an almost endless number of references - the seven virtues, deadly sins, Shakespeare's ages of Man, Wonders of the World, Snow White and the dwarfs, the Hills of Rome, This evening adds another to the unending list - Fr. Leeder's seven Suffolk years. We shall all have many happy memories of those years.

"When Fr. Leeder arrived at St. Pancras and suffered his first 'ordeal by congregation,' the then parish priest was the late Canon Thompson. I'm sure Fr. Leeder will agree that he learned much from Canon Thompson's deep religious faith and convictions, his wise council, his wit and unfailing good humour and his courage in the face of adversity. These were to prove most valuable years to Fr. Leeder to prepare for and to meet the wind of change.

This started to blow through the whole Church with the Vatican Councils and through St. Pancras Church with the invasion, from across the Scottish border, of Canon Thompson's successor, Fr. Edward McBride.

"For the next few years Fr. Leeder was much engaged in a great spring cleaning exercise: bringing up-to-date of everything from the Liturgy to the church seating arrangements. In fact there was a period when Fr. Leeder so expended his energies in continually moving the church pews from one place to another that when he came to hear evening Confessions he was so exhausted that we all escaped with the shortest penances on record.

"Last year, as you know, Fr. McBride left us to go to Norwich and we welcomed as his successor our present parish priest, Fr. Norman Smith.

"So in seven years at Ipswich Fr. Leeder has worked with three different parish priests. All of them have spoken most highly of his hard work and great good influence in the Parish - with a few sly digs about avoirdupois and a propensity for short naps during other people's sermons. Fr. Smith is now, very sorry to lose him, as indeed are we all.

"There must be few who do not know that the re-forming of the 12th Ipswich Scout Group was directly the work of Fr. Leeder. This is now a flourishing organisation and a live memorial to him. He took a very active and practical part in scout activities and, until recently, he was in fact the Group Scout Leader. He was no martinet; but he did always demand a high code of conduct from all the Cubs, Scouts and Venture Scouts in the group. He will be greatly missed - and remembered with affection and respect (and for his predilection for sausages at Scout camps).
