Fr Joseph writes:

'They will not believe even if someone should rise from the dead' (Lk 16:31).

Even many good, practising Catholics probably do not think long and hard about the resurrection of their bodies at the end of time. After all, so long as our souls arrive in heaven safely, what else matters? However, not only is the physical resurrection of Christ critically important in itself, without it our faith would be in vain (1 Cor 15:17) and the building blocks of our religion would collapse. How so? Our religion is not simply a nice story, nor is it something that is limited to the spiritual world. Ours is an *incarnational* religion, that is, God entered into His own created order and took to Himself the nature He had created for us. God uses created material things, as well as people, in order to bring about our redemption and the creation of a new heaven and a new earth (Apoc 21:1). He uses water, bread, wine, oil, words, and gestures, but He also uses nails, thorns, wood, vinegar, blood, and human flesh. In other words, our religion is based on, and accomplished through, actual and concrete events in history, historical events made sacramentally present to us through yet more material objects in the sacred liturgy, as well as words and gestures.

The Son of God died in the flesh. Our Faith tells us that He also rose again in the flesh. He appeared in the midst of locked rooms but He was no ghost: ghosts do not eat as Christ ate (Lk 24:42-43), ghosts may not be touched as Christ was touched by His Apostles (Jn 20:27). The point is that, in an incarnational religion, the material created order is used as a vehicle to bring about the redemption of the spiritual, as a channel through which God reaches down to His creatures and draws them back to Himself. Yet even more than that, the material world, which itself suffered rupture and disharmony as a result of both Lucifer's and Adam's sinful rebellions against God's goodness, is mended, restored, and raised up to become part of the new heaven and the new earth, where the wolf shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard lie down with the sheep (Is 11:6).

Contrary to many heresies, the physical, material world is not evil in itself, but is part of the goodness of God's creation. It stands in need of redemption, certainly, because of the rupture caused by sin, and every creature groans in pain and travail as it awaits its redemption (Rom 8:22), but the material world is not left behind in God's work of atonement. Rather, it is an integral part of God's work of creation and redemption.

At the moment of His resurrection, and as the first born from the dead (Col 1:18), the risen Lord leads the way *in His body* for all who are to stand before the throne of God in heaven when the accuser, that is, Satan, is overthrown and cast down into hell (Apoc 12:10-12).

However sceptical our modern scientific age may be, generations from earlier, more enlightened, times have placed their faith and their hope in a physically resurrected Lord whose flesh we consume sacramentally in the Holy Eucharist, and by whose wounds we have been healed (1 Pet 2:24).
