Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XXXVI At this stage of the Canon of the Mass, the priest, once again, reminds himself that he is a sinner, and calls upon all present to remind themselves that they are sinners: at the words, 'though sinners,' the priest strikes his breast in penitence.

To us, also, your servants, who, though sinners, hope in your abundant mercies, graciously grant some share and fellowship with your holy Apostles and Martyrs: with John the Baptist, Stephen, Matthias, Barnabas, Ignatius, Alexander, Marcellinus, Peter, Felicity, Perpetua, Agatha, Lucy, Agnes, Cecilia, Anastasia, and all your Saints; admit us, we beseech you, into their company, not weighing our merits, but granting us your pardon, through Christ our Lord.

The first list of saints earlier in the Canon differs from this list insofar as, previously, we prayed that through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the saints we might be defended and protected from harm here below. In this second list, we pray that we might one day join them in heaven above. But why pray to these particular saints? First, we pray to St John the Baptist of whom Our Lord said, 'There has not risen among them that are born of women a greater than John the Baptist' (Mt 11:11). Stephen is the first Christian martyr, stoned on the instructions of Saul who would later become St. Paul (Acts 6-7). St. Matthias was elected to take the place of Judas (Acts 1:15-26). St. Ignatius was a disciple of St Peter and followed him as bishop of Antioch. There is also a tradition that Ignatius was the boy whom Christ placed before His disciples saying, 'Whosoever shall receive one such child as this in my name, receives me' (Mk 9:35-36 et par). Alexander is either one of the sons of St. Felicity or he was the fifth Pope, Alexander I. Although water had previously been added to the wine in the chalice at the Offertory, it was Pope Alexander I who first insisted that water should be added, teaching that it represents the weakness of humanity which is strengthened and transformed by the fortified wine of Christ's divinity. Marcellinus and Peter were martyred under the fierce persecution of Diocletian when all Christians throughout the Roman Empire were obliged to adore the Emperor or die by torture. Marcellinus was a priest, and Peter an Exorcist (one of the minor Orders below Acolyte and Deacon). Both were imprisoned, but when Peter managed to convert his gaoler and his family, and have them baptised by Marcellinus, they were tortured to death. Interestingly, under this particular persecution, Marcellinus and Peter were the only two clerics in Rome to die for the Faith, all other clerics either apostatised or escaped.

Having listed seven men, the Canon now lists seven women martyrs. (Curiously, none of the Eucharistic Prayers written in the twentieth century mentions any women saints.) Felicity was a slave who was eight months pregnant when arrested. She gave birth safely before being thrown to the lions in the amphitheatre in Carthage along with Perpetua, a nobleborn woman of the aristocracy. In fact, the beasts did not finish them off, so they were both finally beheaded. A memorial stone with their names on it was discovered in Carthage in a 1907 archaeological dig. Less is known for certain about the remaining five, but Agatha was martyred in Sicily under the Emperor Decian in 251. Part of her torture was to have her breasts cut off. Lucy was born in Sicily about fifty years later and, like Agatha, chose to keep her vow of virginity for the sake of Christ rather than be married. Her would-be husband denounced her as a Christian and she was martyred in 303. Agnes was thirteen years old when she was martyred and it was said that 'no fetters could be found small enough for her wrists.' Cecilia was martyred even earlier, in 117, under the Emperor Marcus Aurelius. Anastasia, a Greek girl, died in the Diocletian persecution on Christmas Day, which is, therefore, also her feast day.
