Fr Joseph writes: The Mass-Pt XXXXII As we have already seen in this series, Christ as the Lamb of God is both a striking and a recurring image in the Sacred Scriptures and in the Church's liturgy and iconography.

The first image of a good shepherd in the Bible is that of Abel, the son of Adam and Eve who offered 'of the firstlings of his flock,' that is, the best (Gen 4:1,4). But just as Cain was born first, sinned by keeping the best of his crop for himself, and through pride and jealousy ended up killing his brother (Gen 4:1-8), so mankind entered the world, sinned by taking the best for himself, and through pride ended up killing his adopted Brother, Our Lord Jesus Christ, who, as the Incarnate Word-Made-Flesh, was born into the world after him. The parallel is not accidental.

Abraham is a shepherd, and famously sacrifices a ram (rather than a lamb) in place of his son Isaac (Gen 22:13). The ram gets its horns caught in the thorns, which, of course, reminds us of Christ being crowned with thorns.

The Old Testament Joseph is a shepherd (Gen 37:1). Moses is a shepherd (Ex 3:1). King David is a shepherd (1 Sam/1 Kings 16:11-13). Many of the key figures throughout the Sacred Scriptures are shepherds although, interestingly, none of the Twelve Apostles are. The imagery of shepherds, of sheep, and of lambs runs throughout.

But Our Lord is both the Priest who offers sacrifice and the Victim who is sacrificed, so, as well as being the Good Shepherd (Jn 10:11) Our Lord is also the Lamb. Christ is the innocent Lamb offered in sacrifice on behalf of a fallen race. St John the Baptist is the first person to herald Our Lord as the Lamb of God (Jn 1:36). The imagery is taken up at the Last Supper when the disciples are commanded to make everything ready for the celebration of the Passover, an episode introduced by Luke with the words, 'And the day of the unleavened bread came, on which it was necessary that the pasch should be killed' (Lk 22:7). The implication is clear: Our Lord is to be the new Passover Lamb who is to be sacrificed so that the Angel of Death might pass over His disciples (Ex 12:13, 23). And, what is more, the Apostles are commanded to offer up this same sacrifice—now in the Sacramental form of Eucharistic Bread and Wine which has become Our Lord's Body and Blood—'as a commemoration for me' (Lk 22:19). In other words, part of what the Apostles are commanded to do is to offer up the Lamb of God, the Lamb of the New Covenant, as a sacrifice for the forgiveness of sins. What is offered up to the Father at Mass is the consecrated Body and Blood of Our Lord, but in making this offering the priest offers up the Lamb of God whose Blood washes away the guilt of sin, the sin of the world (Apoc 7:14; 22:14).

So it is that at this point of the Mass we plead with the sacrificed Lamb of God to have mercy on us and grant us peace, that peace which can only come with penitence on the part of sinners, with the forgiveness of sins bestowed by God, and with a reconciliation and reunion with the God who made us but from whom we have become alienated by sin.

Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi: miserere nobis. 'Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.'
