## DAY OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

All must **FAST** who have reached the age of 18, until their 60<sup>th</sup> birthday. (Others, especially children, are encouraged to fast.) To fast means eating less than you would normally, and in any case no more than one meal and two small snacks. The sick, the frail, expectant and nursing mothers are exempt from fasting. ABSTINENCE means avoiding eating meat and fowl, and foodstuffs made from them, as a reminder of the Word-Made-Flesh who died for us. The laws of abstinence apply to all who have reached their 14<sup>th</sup> birthday.

Daily Stations of the Cross The plan is to make sure the Stations of the Cross are said in our church by at least one person each day in Lent. Please sign the rota at the back of the church.



#### AND BY THE HOLY SPIRIT Was Incarnate Of The Virgin Mary

The Holy Spirit is both the Gift and the Giver of Life, as we shall see a little later in the Creed. He it is that the Father gives when He bestows life on someone: God 'breathed into [Adam's] nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living being' (Gen 2:7). Indeed, the Hebrew words for breath and spirit are the same,  $r\hat{u}a\hbar$ . The Father breathed His breath, His life-giving Spirit, into the first man and gave him life. It is this same spirit, the Holy Spirit, this life-giving breath of God, that would overshadow Our Lady at the moment of the Annunciation (Lk 1:35) causing Life Himself to be conceived in her womb. It is because of this overshadowing, and of her docile submission to the power of the Holy Spirit, that Our Lady is sometimes known in Catholic devotion as the Spouse of the Holy Spirit.

For her part, tradition teaches that Our Lady was presented in the Temple in Jerusalem very early in her childhood to consecrate herself and her virginity to Almighty God. Unlike Zechariah's doubt when he is told that his wife Elizabeth will, in her old age, conceive a son (Lk 1:18), Mary's question in Lk 1:34 shows her confusion rather than lack of faith. In effect, Zechariah asked, 'how can this happen?' whilst Mary asked, 'how will this happen?' God knows that she has pledged her virginity to Him, a custom unknown to Judaism. How, then, was she to conceive unless God were to renounce her gift to Him and call upon her to consummate her marriage to St Joseph? The Archangel Gabriel provides the answer: the Holy Spirit will come upon her, and she will conceive by the power of the Most High whilst retaining her virginity. Far from discounting her gift, God chooses her to bear His Incarnate Son precisely because of her willingness to renounce herself.

God chose Mary before she herself was born, filling her with grace (Lk 1:28) and preserving her from suffering the stain of Adam's original sin: she was conceived in her mother's womb immaculate, and remained sinless throughout her life. It was fitting that God should preserve pure and intact the body of she who would bear the Incarnate body of His Only Begotten Son, and, by bringing Him into the world in Bethlehem, herself become the Mother of God. Even so, she remained free to



choose to accept God's will, and her *fiat*, her 'let it be,' forms the crown of her faithful submission to the will of God.

The most severe consequence of Adam's, and our, proud rebellion against the will of God is death, the final parting of body and soul, a separation never intended by God. However, Our Lady, at the end of her natural life on earth, with the purity of her virginity still perfectly intact, was assumed body and soul into heaven, to be crowned Queen of Heaven, glorious among the saints and angels of God.

The Church has defined four dogmas concerning the Blessed Virgin Mary: (1) her Immaculate Conception in her mother's womb, (2) her perpetual Virginity, (3) that she is Theotókos or Mother of God, and (4) that she was Assumed body and soul into heaven at the end of her life on earth.
