Fr Joseph writes:

BAPTISM – OF WATER AND THE HOLY SPIRIT

John the Baptist was sent by God to prepare the way for the Savior, and to baptize people with water as a mark of their repentance, but he explained that the Christ would baptize with the Holy Spirit (Mt 3:1,11). Our Lord told Nicodemus of the need to be baptized by water and the Holy Spirit (Jn 3:5). And when St Paul came across some disciples at Ephesus who had only been baptized with John's baptism, and who had not even heard that there was such a thing as the Holy Spirit, he promptly baptized them anew (Acts 19:1-8).

For someone to be validly baptized (that is, for the grace of the Sacrament actually to be infused into a person's soul), the individual must ask for the Sacrament (or, in the case of infants, a parent or godparent must ask on their behalf). In other words, anyone being baptized must freely choose to be baptized because to receive God's grace in the Sacrament must involve the gift of self to God. Love can only be given; God cannot take our love.

Water must be used for a valid baptism because there must be a correlation between the outward sign and the interior effect. As baptism is chiefly about being washed from the stain of original sin (and from actual, or personal, sins in the case of someone who has reached the age of reason), the outward sign must signify washing. As we wash with water, and not, for example, with coffee, or Coca-Cola, or milk (unless you are Cleopatra), so the Sacrament must involve being washed with water, through full immersion, by aspersion (sprinkling), or by having water poured over us. The water must flow over the head, and must touch the skin so that the correlation between exterior and interior washing is complete.

The words used must be those given to us by Christ Himself (Mt 28:19), and any variation would render the Sacrament invalid (that is, sanctifying grace would not be given to the soul). So, for example, the words, 'We baptize... (referring to the community)' or 'I baptize you in the name of the Creator and of the Redeemer and of the Sanctifier,' would not be acceptable.

To baptize, water must be poured over the head at the same time as the words are spoken, 'I baptize you in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.'

A priest is the ordinary minister of the Sacrament, but everyone should know how to baptize in the event of an emergency. Catholic doctors, nurses, and midwives in particular should know how to baptize, but even a non-baptized person can validly baptize someone so long as they intend to do what the Church intends (even if they do not understand what it is that the Church intends). If someone is baptized in an emergency and then recovers from that emergency, the remaining ceremonies can be supplied at a later date.

GOOD FRIDAY

DAY OF FASTING AND ABSTINENCE

All must **FAST** who have reached the age of 18, until their 60th birthday. (Others, especially children, are encouraged to fast.) To fast means eating less than you would normally, and in any case no more than one meal and two small snacks. The sick, the frail, expectant and nursing mothers are exempt from fasting. **ABSTINENCE** means avoiding eating meat and fowl, and foodstuffs made from them, as a reminder of the Word-Made-Flesh who died for us. The laws of abstinence apply to all who have reached their 14th birthday.
