EMBER DAYS

From a corruption of the words *Quatuor Tempora* (four times or four seasons), Ember Days are traditional days of fasting and abstinence in supplication for God's blessings, and in thanksgiving for blessings received. Although no longer popularly observed, the Roman Missal still makes provision for their observance, and some people like to incorporate them into their private devotions.

Ember Days in a Holy Year are, perhaps, an especially good way to deepen our devotion to the sufferings of Our Lord by joining Him more fully in His own forty-day fast.

Ember Days fall on Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday this week.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS & BENEDICTION Every Sunday in Lent at 4:30pm beginning today.

Ponder these traditional fourteen moments in the journey of Our Lord from the judgement seat of Pontius Pilate to the hill of Calvary, to the moment of His death and burial in the tomb. Why not make these Sunday afternoon devotions part of your Holy Year Lenten observance and enter into the Passion of Our Lord?

'THE THINGS THAT HAVE BEEN ACCOMPLISHED' Luke 1:1


You are invited to join us for a series of five Lenten meditations on St Luke's account of the Passion narrative.

Fr Joseph writes: Today we begin a short series of brief meditations on the **Four Suffering Servant Songs** found in the Book of Isaiah.

The First Suffering Servant Song — Is 42:1-9

Behold my servant, I will uphold him: my elect, my soul delights in him: I have given my spirit upon him, he shall bring forth judgment to the Gentiles. He shall not cry, nor have respect to person, neither shall his voice be heard abroad. The bruised reed he shall not break, and smoking flax he shall not quench: he shall bring forth judgment unto truth. He shall not be sad, nor troublesome, till he set judgment in the earth: and the islands shall wait for his law. Thus saith the Lord God that created the heavens, and stretched them out: that established the earth, and the things that spring out of it: that giveth breath to the people upon it, and spirit to them that tread thereon. I the Lord have called thee in justice, and taken thee by the hand, and preserved thee. And I have given thee for a covenant of the people, for a light of the Gentiles: That thou might open the eyes of the blind, and bring forth the prisoner out of prison, and them that sit in darkness out of the prison house. I the Lord, this is my name: I will not give my glory to another, nor my praise to graven things. The things that were first, behold they are come: and new things do I declare: before they spring forth, I will make you hear them.

Almost all traditional interpretations of this passage refer to the gentleness and the compassion of the Messiah who will not cause further harm to a reed that is already bruised and who will not extinguish the final spark of hope that is struggling desperately to stay alight. Yet if we look closely we might see an altogether different and surprising interpretation.

In 4 Kings (or 2 Kgs) 18:21 we read: 'Dost thou trust in Egypt a staff of a broken reed, upon which if a man lean, it will break and go into his hand, and pierce it? so is Pharaoh king of Egypt, to all that trust in him.' (See also Is 36:6.) The point is that a bruised and bent reed, or staff, will end up piercing the hand that leans on it. Isaiah is saying in the Song that the Messiah will not break or discard such a reed. Rather, He will judge it for its real worth.

Similarly the image of burning is used in the Old Testament predominantly as a symbol of God's wrath and judgement (for example Is 1:31; Ezek 20:47). In the *Song*, the prophet Isaiah is saying that the Messiah will not quench the fire that burns away evil and that purifies.

The clue comes in the very next line ('he shall bring forth judgment unto truth'). And the clue continues throughout the whole of this First Song of the Suffering Servant which has, as its dominant theme, the judgment that the Messiah will 'bring forth to the Gentiles' (Is 42:1).

Rather than being a prophecy of Our Lord's compassion, this *First Song* is quoted in Matthew's Gospel as part of Our Lord's clash with the Pharisees and is, therefore, part of God's warning against complacency and trust in our own judgment (Mt chap. 12). After all, does not St John the Baptist warn that the Messiah will come to burn the chaff with unquenchable fire? (Mt 3:12; Lk 3:17)

At the beginning of Lent, then, we do well to avoid the pitfalls that Our Lord is warning the Pharisees against, namely the snares of pride and self-satisfaction, of autonomy and self-sufficiency, of complacency and lukewarmness!

Now re-read the *First Song of the Suffering Servant* and Matthew chapter 12 in the light of these thoughts.
