

The Bill has been debated again in parliament and some amendments have been proposed. MPs are expected to vote on the Third Reading of the Bill on Friday of this week, 20th June. The news media have reported that a number of MPs have changed their minds and, having voted in favour of the Bill at earlier stages, have now decided to vote against it. This means that there is still a very real chance that the Bill may be defeated.

Fr Joseph writes: We continue our short series on the third Person of the Blessed Trinity —

The Holy Spirit pt IV: The Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit bestows upon us Seven Gifts in the Sacrament of Confirmation and marks us with an indelible character, fits us to become soldiers of Christ, and commissions us to share in the Church’s mission to preach the Gospel. What are the Seven Gifts? ‘And the spirit of the Lord shall rest upon him: the spirit of wisdom, and of understanding, the spirit of counsel, and of fortitude, the spirit of knowledge, and of godliness. And he shall be filled with the spirit of the fear of the Lord’ (Is 11:2, Douai-Rheims).

Wisdom helps us to value the things of heaven. Valuing the things of this world is easy, but in the end what really matters are God and the things of God. Like a sailor using the stars to navigate by, wisdom helps us to keep our eyes on the things above and arrive safely at our heavenly home.

Understanding helps us to grasp the truths of religion so that, whilst we shall never be able to understand fully the infinite mystery of God, nevertheless we shall be able to understand more and more by listening to what He says through the voice of His Church and the Scriptures, and by wrapping ourselves in prayer.

Counsel helps us to choose correctly the best approach to serving God, helping us to do God’s will and to follow the path He has called us to follow. Even when we know which path to follow, we still need the Holy Spirit to help bend our heart to God’s will, and choose to do what He wants.

Fortitude (or might or power) is the spiritual strength which helps us to overcome the difficulties which could stop us from living the Faith, giving us courage to make the right decisions, and the endurance to stay on the right path.

Knowledge helps us to see what path to follow, and to see the dangers to our faith. Counsel helps us to choose to follow God’s path, but knowledge helps us to see – in the midst of our tangled world – which of the many paths in life is God’s path in the first place.

Godliness (or holiness or piety) fills a person with confidence in God and an eagerness to love and serve Him. When we read the lives of the saints one thing we notice is that all any of them want to do is to love and serve God. They have a great eagerness to do God’s will.

Fear of the Lord makes a person aware of God’s might and sovereignty, and enables us to gaze at Him with wonder and awe, and to respect His laws. It is easy to forget just how powerful God is, and that everything that exists belongs to Him. Fear of the Lord means holding God in great awe and respect simply because He is God. But in the end (because ‘perfect love casts out fear,’ 1 John 4:18) the fear we should have is fear of sin, fear of offending One whom we love, and who loves us so much. The presence of the Holy Spirit in the form of these seven Gifts sanctifies us, and increases and strengthens in us the sanctifying grace that we have already been given in Baptism.
