**Fr Joseph writes:** This week we continue our brief series on The Most Precious Blood of Our Lord to which the month of July is dedicated.

#### The Precious Blood of Our Lord Jesus Christ pt II

The first blood shed in the Bible is that of Abel. In the first story of the Bible following the Creation and the Fall of Mankind (Genesis 1-3) we have the tale of Cain and his brother Abel (Genesis 4). Cain is the older of the two brothers and is an arable farmer, growing crops, whilst Abel is a shepherd. The contrast is important because a crop farmer is tied to the land whereas a shepherd may be called by God to gather his belongings and rise, and follow God to another land, as Abraham was called to rise up and follow God's call just a few chapters later (Gen 12). Note that many of the leaders of the People of Israel are shepherds: Abraham, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, King David, and Amos, to name but a few. This becomes even more important when we recall that Our Lord is the Good Shepherd who lays down His life, and sheds His blood, for His sheep (Jn 10:11,17-18). Our Lord calls St Peter to become the chief shepherd of His flock when He says to him three times, 'Feed my sheep,' and then warns him that he, too, will shed his blood (Jn 21:15-19). And it is worth noting that the first to worship the Christ Child in the stable in Bethlehem are shepherds who were unfettered enough to be able to rise up and follow the call of God (Lk 2:15).

It is because Abel had kept his heart unfettered, and because he offered to God 'the firstlings of his flock,' that is, the best (Gen 4:4), whilst Cain merely offered 'of the fruits of the earth,' keeping the best for himself (v.3), that God 'had respect to Abel, and to his offerings. But to Cain and his offerings He had no respect' (vv.4-5). God exhorts Cain not to be angry but to offer a purer gift next time: 'If thou do well, shalt thou not receive?' (v.7). But Cain's angry jealousy got the better of him, and he slew his brother (v.8).

God goes looking for Abel, just as God had searched for Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden after they had sinned (Gen 3:8-9). God asks Cain where his brother is, and Cain famously retorts, 'Am I my brother's keeper?' (Gen 4:9), but Abel's blood has been poured out and now 'cries [to God] from the earth' (v.10) and he who spilt that blood is cursed by God and his labours shall be in vain, and he shall be a fugitive upon the earth (vv.11-12).

This curse represents the punishment that is properly owing to all of us for our sinful offences against God. Cain recognizes the justice of the curse (v.13) but cries out for mercy, fearing that, as a vagabond and an outlaw, anyone may kill him with impunity (v.14). God responds to this cry for mercy, assures him that no one has the right to kill him, and marks Cain to show that he is under God's protection henceforth (v.15).

God's merciful response to Cain's plea follows on from the blood of Abel that cries out from the earth. God is a just God, not a vengeful God. Justice must follow in the wake of Cain's sin, but mercy is also to be had. There is punishment for Cain, but not everlasting damnation.

Next week we shall see how this relates to the shedding of Christ's blood as we look at the Letter to the Hebrews.
